## The Debate about Confederate Iconography with Kevin Levin at the NCWM

(*Harrisburg*, *PA*) – The National Civil War Museum continues its 2017 Lessons in History lecture series as Kevin Levin, Independent Scholar, presents "Confronting Confederate Iconography in the Wake of the Charleston Massacre," April 22, 2017 1:00 pm - 2:00 pm, education gallery, first floor. Communities across the country have removed or relocated flags and monuments often following heated debates. This talk will explore the history of Confederate iconography by focusing on a number of key periods in which these symbols gained traction and took hold in this nation's popular memory of the war.
